


Taplow Residents meeting 23 October 2015



The Airports Commission has made an unambiguous and unanimous recommendation for Heathrow





The Commission recommends a new approach, with airport expansion part of wider package that addresses social, environmental and economic impacts

Limiting Noise Impacts

- A ban on night flights before 6am, only possible with expansion
- A legally binding cap on noise and more reliable respite
- An independent aviation noise authority with a statutory right to be consulted on flight paths and other operations

Listening to Local People / Rebuilding Trust

- A new independent Community Engagement Board with real influence over compensation and airport operations
- Sufficient progress on air quality to be a legally binding planning condition
- Government to rule out any future 'fourth runway' in Parliament


Improving Compensation

- A new noise charge or levy to fund improved compensation for communities. Any charge must be fair, affordable, locally spent, transparent and VfM.
- Heathrow to pay more than £1 billion in compensation to local communities, including noise insulation and voluntary purchase schemes
- Anyone who would lose their home to compensated at 125% of its full value plus costs, funded by Heathrow

Sharing Economic Benefits


- Apprenticeships to help local young people access the more than 70,000 new jobs
- Action to safeguard regional connectivity, including reduced charges and more liberal Public Service Obligations

Heathrow 2030






One integrated airport – 'Fewer, Larger Terminals'




Steps to runway opening











The Airports Commission agrees with our finding that Heathrow expansion can take place within air quality limits



Heathrow has cut emissions by 16% in the last 5 years




The Airports Commission recognises the challenges of growing demand on the transport network but concluded that airport expansion is a small proportion of total trips




"Government needs to act to address capacity issues from background growth the additional challenges from airport expansion would not be a transformative factor."


Which means that the airport can grow without increasing airport traffic

Heathrow expansion is good for business


Expansion will benefit the large number of airport-related industries located around Heathrow.

Better connectivity and improved range of destinations will attract inward investment and trade, and provide opportunities for SMEs






